Of course, there are the big two, including Microsoft Excel and Google Sheets. Those are the two we recommend to just about everybody. There are still other options in case those two don't work for you. Here are the best excel apps (spreadsheet apps) for Android! AndriOpen Office is the first official mobile port of OpenOffice. It features a bunch of things, including a word processor, a spreadsheet function, a presentation function, and a few extras. You can even draw and do math in this thing. We're here to talk about spreadsheet functionality. It's surprisingly good for a mobile app and it competes favorably with the big dogs even if it doesn't have every single feature. You can import Microsoft Excel files (XLS and XLT) which makes switching over relatively simple. It's an excellent alternative to Google's and Microsoft's solutions. It covers the basics, including a word processor, a worksheet function, and a presentations function. It boasts 111 different functions, various column customization, and sorting. The app seems to struggle with some more complicated styling you may have imported from other apps, but again it works for the simple stuff. Google Sheets Price: Free Google Sheets is one of the two biggest competitors in the spreadsheet space on mobile. It attaches to Google Drive, features cross-platform support (via the web), is compatible with Microsoft Office files, and it has a ton of functionality. We're particularly fond of its collaborative features so multiple people can work on the same spreadsheet at the same time in real time. Additionally, it boasts a ton of functions and customization. We still think Excel is the more powerful spreadsheet app. However, Google Sheets is vastly more accessible and easier to get into for new folks. It's entirely free to use with Google Drive unless you need more than 15GB of space, then you have to pay for it. The mobile version is free for simple stuff but you do need a Microsoft 365 subscription to unlock the best stuff. There is an option to pay once, but it's only for desktop apps. The subscription isn't overly expensive for personal use and the family plan (\$9.99 per month) is a surprisingly good bargain for households. It's been around for a long time and has a bunch of features along with a full office experience. The spreadsheet portion isn't bad at all and it includes support for stuff like Excel files and more. In terms of pure usability, it's surprisingly good although the free version is a bit dry on features. The \$4.99 per month (or \$29.99 per year) subscription removes ads, adds 154 document formats, and unlocks two dozen additional features. The good news is the license is good for both mobile (Android and iOS) and PC so you only have to pay for it one time. Polaris Office Price: Free / Up to \$5.99 per month / Up to \$29.99 per year Polaris Office is another older and more mature alternative to Microsoft Office and Google Drive. It's been around for ages and has a bunch of features, including support for Excel file types if you want to go that route. You can use the spreadsheet function for a bunch of stuff, including graphs and various other functions. The app also has a delightful and relatively modern Material Design UI. The premium version is front-loaded such that it encourages users heavily to go with the yearly subscription over the monthly one and the app itself has a few bugs. Otherwise, it's a solid option. It has a decent number of modern features for its price tag, including the ability to edit documents with other people and chat with them through the app directly. Short for "application," apps let you do everything from listening to music to syncing your phone to your car to playing games. With so many apps to choose from, however, it can be a bit daunting if you don't know how to download them. Fortunately, downloading apps can be quick, simple and easy regardless of the kind of technology you're using. Read on to learn about how and where to download apps. When you download a file on the net, whether from a store or elsewhere, a file hosted on an online server is copied onto your computer. If you've ever been online, either on a phone or computer, you've likely already downloaded files on many occasions. Apps are no different — they're just specific kinds of files you download from the internet. Photo Courtesy: Scott Barbour/Getty Images Apps are typically set up as executable (.exe) files, although apps meant for Apple devices often come as either APP (.app) or DMG (.dmg) files. Sometimes (especially when it's meant for computers), an app is compressed into a ZIP file (.zip or .zipx) to save space. To do this, you may need another program, such as WinZip or 7-Zip, to open it, although you may also be able to open it by left- or right-clicking if your device came with the ability to open ZIP files. In many cases, however, downloading an app is as simple as clicking a button on an app's page. As long as there's enough space left on your device, the app will likely be ready for use once it's done downloading. Android is an operating system used for phones, tablets and more. Odds are that if your phone isn't an iPhone, it's probably an Android device — brands include Samsung, Huawei, LG, Motorola, ZTE and many more. To download apps for an Android device, you can either visit the Android website or use the Google Play app. (It's often pre-installed on phones and tablets, so you may already have it.) Be aware that you'll likely be prompted to sign in with your Google account or create one if you haven't already. Free CUDA Video Converter Free CUDA Video Converter is a free utility for performing video conversions. There is also a paid version. The free version works well and supports an impressive number of video formats, but is unsupported. The interface is easy to use, but offers only a very basic feature set such as a preview window and the ability to merge video clips. 2. Prism Video File Converter Plus Prism Video File Converter Plus is a video conversion utility that supports batch conversions. In addition to being able to convert video files, the utility also offers DVD conversions (sadly there is no Blue Ray support). In addition, the utility allows groups of video files to be burned to a video DVD or to a video CD. Prism Video File Converter Plus costs \$49.99, but a free 14-day trial is available for download. 3. Format Factory Format Factory is a free utility for converting videos from one format to another. Although video conversion is arguably the utility's primary focus, it is also capable of converting images and audio as well. Format Factory supports batch conversions and includes various profiles that can be used to write the converted videos to various formats and / or devices. For instance, you can use one of the included profiles to convert videos and write them to your mobile device. The utility also supports CD and DVD ripping, and also includes support for ISO files. 4. MyVideoConverter Pro MyVideoConverter Pro is a relatively lightweight tool for converting videos from one format to another. In spite of the fact that MyVideoConverter Pro uses a rather simplistic interface, it does offer support for a large number of file formats. Additionally, MyVideoConverter Pro is able to rip DVDs and burn videos to DVD. The tool is also able to split large files and join multiple files into one. MyVideoConverter Pro sells for \$39.95, but a free trial version is available for download. The trial version is fully functional, but places a watermark over converted videos. 5. Freemake Video Converter Freemake Video Converter is a free utility for converting media such as video, DVDs, audio, and pictures to various formats. The utility uses a very intuitive interface that lets you simply add the media that you want to convert and then select the format or device that you want to convert to. The nice thing about this utility (aside from it being easy to use) is that it supports formats that are often omitted from other conversion utilities such as Sony or Xbox. The utility also supports Blue Ray, which is nice since many converters do not offer Blue Ray support. Also read:
