The Harvard School of Dental Medicine (HSDM) is not located on the university's historic main campus in Cambridge, but a few miles away in Boston's Longwood Medical Area. HSDM students study alongside Harvard medical students for part of their coursework, and they also gain hands-on experience at the Harvard Dental Center, which sees over 25,000 patients annually. New York University's large College of Dentistry graduates close to 400 DDS students every year. Students take courses in a range of biomedical, behavioral, and clinical areas. Extensive clinical practice is a hallmark of the program, and NYU takes pride in the diversity of its patient pool. Students gain real-world experience in all four years of their education, and they work closely with their group practice directors and faculty. NYU's dental school is the largest in the country, and nearly 10% of all dentists in the United States were educated there. The school supports 50 rotation sites in North Carolina as well as two free clinics led by students. These clinics receive over 90,000 patient visits annually. DMD students can also choose from numerous degree options, including dual degrees in bioethics, public health, business administration, law, and education. The school's Primary Care Unit handles roughly 22,000 patients each year. University of Pittsburgh School of Dental Medicine has been around since 1896. Like most schools on this list, Pitt recognizes that medical training is not restricted to the classroom. The school encourages community service and research, and dental students receive hands-on experiences at the WISER Center, with its simulation-based training facility. Pitt Dental students will also serve as patients for each other as they hone their clinical skills. The University of Washington. The school is home to 390 students, including 248 DDS candidates. Students will find plenty of areas for clinical experiences, including Harborview Medical Center, Seattle Children's Hospital, and, of course, the School of Dentistry's own clinics. The school offers some opportunities that may be difficult to find elsewhere, including a mobile geriatric dental clinic, a clinic specializing in the care of persons with disabilities, and a clinic focused on patients with significant dental fears and psychological conditions.

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
