## How to do a hard restart on my iPhone 11

Force restarting an iPhone 11, iPhone 11 Pro, or iPhone 11 Pro Max may be necessary as a troubleshooting measure sometimes. Usually you'd only need to force restart iPhone 11 / iPhone 11 Pro if the device becomes unresponsive or otherwise unusable for some reason, like an app has frozen or the system software itself has become frozen. This article will show you exactly how you can forcibly reboot an iPhone 11, iPhone 11 Pro, or iPhone 11 Max. Press and release Volume Up Press and release Volume Down Press and hold the Power / Sleep / Wake button Continue holding only the Power / Sleep button until you see the Apple logo on the screen Once you see the Apple logo on the display you can release the Power / Sleep / Wake button, and the iPhone 11, iPhone 11 Pro, or iPhone 11 Pro Max will force restart and boot itself back up again as usual. It can take a few seconds before you see the Apple logo appear on the screen of iPhone 11, iPhone 11 Pro, iPhone 11 Pro Max, so just keep holding the Power / Sleep button until you do see the Apple logo appear, after you see the logo just let the phone boot as usual. A forced restart does exactly what it sounds like; it interrupts anything that is currently going on with the iPhone 11 or iPhone 11 Pro and forces the device to restart itself immediately. Sometimes this is referred to as a force restart, a force reboot, a hard reboot, or a hard restart, and erroneously sometimes you will see to this referred to as a 'hard reset' but that is not proper terminology in that reset implies resetting the settings which a hard reboot does not do. Note that forcibly restarting an iPhone may result in data loss from any unsaved data, for example if an app has frozen before any data from that app could be saved and you force restart the iPhone 11 / iPhone 11 Pro / iPhone 11 Pro Max, it is possible that the apps data would be gone. This does not always happen, but it can, so be aware of that as a theoretical possibility. You can also more simply shut down the iPhone 11, iPhone 11 Pro, iPhone 11 Pro Max by holding the Power button and then choosing "Swipe to Power Off" or by shutting down iPhone via Settings app which doesn't require any button pressing at all. Shutting down will power down the iPhone. Force restarting iPhone as a troubleshooting technique has been possible since the first iPhone, but the procedure for how to force reboot is often different per device model. If you want to know how to forcibly reboot other iPhone models aside from iPhone 11, iPhone 11 Pro, and iPhone 11 Pro Max, the following articles might be helpful to you: The last several releases of iPhone models have shared a sequence for force restarting, whereas earlier model iPhones were different, particularly iPhone models with a physically clickable Home button. The same differences and variations apply to iPad models as well, but obviously we're focusing on iPhone here. Related Forcing an Apple iPhone 11, Pro, Or Pro Max to restart is not complicated, but requires some unusual button action and there are two methods. Forcing an Apple iPhone 11, Pro, or Pro Max to restart is not complicated, but requires some unusual actions from the user. iOS is designed to be simple to use and most aspects are quite obvious. However, from time to time situations can arise that require the user to take steps that are not intuitive, such as pressing and holding an on-screen or physical button. Such is the case with forcing an iPhone to restart. In addition, the method varies slightly for some older devices. The iPhone 11 series phones are the latest flagship phones from Apple. That means the iconic round home button at the bottom of older and budget models is no longer present, opting for a higher screen to body ratio. Apple held onto the home button for all its phones for many years, a distinguishing feature for the brand when compared to the more prevalent Android phones. Removing this physical button affects how device owners interact with the phone. It's rare that an iPhone needs to be restarted, but it can happen, particularly if the phone is running a beta version of iOS or Flight Test apps that have not been released in the App Store. To force an iPhone 11, iPhone 11 Pro or iPhone 11 Pro Max to restart is not complicated, but requires pressing and holding certain physical buttons in the correct sequence. As Apple explains, locate the power button (on the right) and volume buttons (on the left) on the phone. Press and hold the power button, and one of the volume buttons, until the 'slide to power off' slider appears. Emergency SOS and Medical ID sliders will also appear. Slide to the right to power off the phone, then wait a moment and power on again, by pressing and holding the power button until you see the Apple logo. An Alternate Method Of Restarting An iPhone In the rare event the above method of forcing a restart doesn't work, there is an alternate method for those with iOS 13 or higher. Detailed by Verizon, press and release volume up, press and release volume down, then hold the power button and keep holding for approximately 15 to 30 seconds. The display will go black during this time. The power button can be released when the Apple logo appears on the screen. Apple has always aimed for simplicity and clarity with its computers and mobile devices, yet some processes can still seem complicated. This is especially true for those actions that the user is unlikely to do often, if ever. If your phone is sluggish, freezes or keeps restarting itself, you may need to restart it. Usually if this is the case, you'll know because the screen will be completely unresponsive and nothing will happen when you press buttons or touch it. If this happens, there are a few ways to force restart your iPhone 11 model. A significant change was the removal of the home button on the iPhone 11 Pro and iPhone 11 Pro Max. This means you can no longer long press the physical home button to force restart your phone. Instead, you have to press both the volume up and volume down buttons rapidly, not simultaneously — one after another. And then, hold the power button to restart the iPhone. How to Force Restart an iPhone 11, iPhone X, iPhone 12 If you have an iPhone 11, iPhone 12 Pro, iPhone 11 Pro Max, the fastest way to restart or hard reset your iPhone is: Step 1. Press and quickly release the volume up button on iPhone. Step 2. Now quickly do the same with volume down button. Step 3. Press and hold down the Power button on your iOS device. Step 4. Release the power button when you see the Apple logo. By force restarting and hard resetting the device, you can hopefully close those apps and unfreeze your device. Before you begin this process, make sure your iOS device is plugged in for extra juice. You don't want to have a dead battery while attempting to shut down your apps. The company states that if your iPhone 11 appears frozen and unresponsive, you can solve the problem with a force restart. There are multiple ways to reset your device if you are experiencing issues. Press and quickly release the Volume up button > press and quickly release the Volume down button > press and hold the Side button until you see the Apple logo. Reset network settings If you are having connectivity issues, you can try resetting your network settings. This will delete all network settings, returning them to factory defaults. From the home screen, select the Settings app > scroll to and select General > Reset > select Reset Network Settings > select Reset Network Settings again to confirm.Perform a factory data resetIf you are still having issues with your device, you may need to do a Factory data reset (Master reset). This will reset all settings to their defaults and erase all data stored on iPhone, including your contacts, messages, and music. 1. From the home screen select the Settings app. Note: iPhone cannot be used while data is being erased. iPhone 3GS and later will instantly and securely erase all data, and then restore settings to their factory defaults. After iPhone reboots, it will display the "Connect to iTunes" screen. If you have backed up your device to iTunes or iCloud, you may be able to restore personal data back to iPhone, if desired. Wi-Fi or a wireless data connection is required to re-activate iPhone after a reset. Select Erase All Content and Settings to reset device. 5. Select Backup Then Erase or Erase Now. 6. Select Erase iPhone then select Erase iPhone again to confirm. When your iPhone's screen is black or frozen and not responding, a normal restart might not work for the simple reason that your iPhone has gotten itself in such a state that it fails to recognize you holding down the power and volume buttons - or your silent prayers. If your iPhone is unresponsive and won't restart the usual way, then a force-restart can bring it back to life. Fear not: a force-restart does not erase anything on your iPhone.From the iPhone 6s to the iPhone 12 and all models in between, here's how you can bring back a stuck iPhone with a force-restart. Force-restart an iPhone 12. iPhone 11, iPhone XS, iPhone XR, iPhone SE (2nd gen), iPhone X or iPhone iForce-restarting an iPhone released in the last four years is a three-button procedure:Press and release the volume-up button.Press and release the volume-down button.Press and hold the side button until the screen turns off and then turns back on. You can release the side button when the Apple logo appears.Force-restart an iPhone 7Press and hold both the volume-down button and the side button until you see the Apple logo.Force-restart an iPhone 6s or iPhone SE (1st-gen)Press and hold both the sleep/wake button and the home button until you see the Apple logo.Last option: Reinstall iOS! your iPhone is really messed up and just won't start, you may need to reinstall its operating system. To do that, connect your iPhone to your computer and start iTunes. Next, perform a force-restart of your iPhone but don't let go of the button(s) when the Apple logo appears. Instead, keep holding until you see the recovery mode screen -- the screen with the iTunes logo and Lightning connector. When you see this screen on your iPhone, you should then see a window in iTunes on your computer to Restore or Update your iPhone. Click Update and iTunes will reinstall iOS -- and will do so without erasing your settings, apps and data. If Update doesn't work, then you'll need to opt for Restore, which will erase all of your data and reinstall iOS and then prompt you to restore a backup in iTunes or iCloud that you hopefully created in the recent past.
